

**These churches are taking part in  
Open Church Day on Saturday 17th September 2011**

**Llanedeyrn, St Edeyrn** (ST 2205 8199 [CF3 6YA](#))



St Edeyrn's church was built with the nave and chancel in one, but they were separated in the 13th or 14th century by the insertion of a chancel arch. Some of the windows are medieval, but most of them date to the Victorian

restoration. The tower is 16th century; the date carved on the west door is damaged but may be 1579.

**Llanfrechfa, All Saints** (ST 3204 9363, [NP44 8DQ](#))



The late-medieval tower is all that survives from the Middle Ages, as the rest was rebuilt in 1873-4 to a design by Charles Buckridge. He added the north aisle to the plan to cater for a larger congregation, and a very large vestry. He also

included an immersion baptistery in the aisle, an unusual feature probably designed with conversions from the Baptist cause in mind.

**Basseleg, St Basil** (ST 2774 8712; [NP10 8ND](#))

The church at Basseleg was an important pre-Norman foundation, probably older than St Woolos' cathedral. Battered walls to the nave, aisle and chancel suggest that at least parts of the present building may be Norman. Most of the architectural details however are Victorian, although the Perpendicular tower retains its medieval form. Some early glass, possibly 17th century Flemish work, survives in the chancel windows.

**Trevethin, Pontypool, St Cadoc** (SO 2838 0202 [NP4 8JF](#))



The only part left of the medieval church is the 16th century tower. The rest was rebuilt in 1845 (architect Thomas Wyatt), to provide an unusual plan with north and south transepts but only one aisle, and galleries in the nave and

aisle.

**Llangwm Uchaf, St Jerome** (SO 4329 0055, [NP15 1HA](#))



In the 15th century, the main entrance of this church would have been from the west, providing a stunning view of the rood screen and loft. After years of neglect, they were lovingly restored 1863-9 by J P Seddon, who used

Partrishow church in Powys as a model for missing details. He also added more windows in the north wall, and built the south porch. There is a Green Man on either side of the chancel arch.

**Llanfair Discoed, St Mary** (ST 4463 9242, [NP16 6LY](#))



The medieval church may just have consisted of what is now the chancel, but it has been rebuilt on numerous occasions, the most recent being 1882-3 (architect Ewan Christian). There used to be an inscription in the porch saying

'This church was bilt in ye yr 1746', but this has now disappeared. The one that is displayed here now, disapproving of games in the churchyard, used to be on a stile in the wall.

**Tintern Parva, St Michael** (ST 5314 0075)



Only the porch of this church survives intact from the Middle Ages. It is an unusually fine one for a church this small, with a stone vaulted roof. The font is also medieval. The present appearance of rest of the church is probably the

result of a restoration in 1889 by J Coates Carter.

**St Michael and All Angels, Llanfihangel Rogiet**

Although this church first appears in documents in c 970 and the main door is Norman, much of the surviving medieval fabric is in the Decorated style, with contemporary effigies. The north aisle was rebuilt in 1904. This church now belongs

to the Friends of Friendless Churches.

Open Sat 17th & Sun 18 Sep 11am - 5pm (restricted access 2.30-3.30, 18 Sep – chargeable event). Park in lay-bys on the B4245 - access on foot through farmyard

**Undy, St Mary the Virgin** (ST 4399 8693 [NP26 3EN](#))



This church has undergone a great deal of alteration. Originally it had a south aisle, and until the middle of the 19th century, there was a central tower, now replaced by a bellcote. Unusually, the west door is not in the middle, but at the south

side so as not to detract from the west window. The porch is dated 1796.

Open 10.30am - 3.00pm every day

**Magor, St Mary** (ST 4253 8692 [NP263HJ](#))



The magnificent church at Magor is mainly Perpendicular in style. The plan is unusual, with a central tower and two 'transepts' that are actually continuous with the aisle. The two-storey porch has a vaulted ceiling to the ground floor; more

vaults seem to have been intended in the south aisle and transepts, but they were never built.

Open 10.30am - 3.00pm every day

**Redwick, St Thomas** (ST 4121 8413 [NP263DE](#))



Redwick church was first mentioned in 1270, but most of the surviving architectural details are Perpendicular although there is a Decorated east window with reticulated tracery. Like Magor, it

has a large elaborate porch. Although there are no transepts, there is a central tower, a feature that this church shares with Caldicot and Shirenewton.

Open 10.30am - 5.00pm every day

**Portskewett, St Mary** (ST 4989 8810; [NP26 5SG](#))



The earliest parts of this church are the Norman chancel arch, the doors to the nave and a window in the north wall of the chancel. The door in the north wall is blocked, but it has a carved cross over the lintel. Later builders contributed

windows in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles. According to the churchwardens' accounts, the gallery was put up in 1818. It escaped being pulled down by the Victorians, and has since been restored.
